NEWS FROM THE GENERAL WARD

As of 2nd April 2018 Sussex Community Foundation NHS Trust is employing our own locum Doctor Joy Kyeyune to provide medical support to Crowborough inpatients. We are also in the process of recruiting a permanent doctor to this post to ensure long term sustainability.

The new arrangements put in place have been a great success for both patients and staff and have enabled us to move towards 7 day, nurse-led admissions, supporting timely admission and discharge planning for our patients as well as enabling patients and relatives to book time to see a doctor to discuss any queries or concerns they may have. We welcome Dr Joy to our team.

We would also like to take this opportunity to thank our GP colleagues for supporting our patients and staff over the last 30 years. Our nursing and medical team will continue to work closely with both local GPs and Dr. Peter Tsang, our Community Geriatrician, to ensure we continue to deliver co-ordinated comprehensive care for our patients.

We have some staff members moving on to new roles. Staff Nurse Dee Pullinger, who has worked at Crowborough for over 10 years, will be moving nearer to her home in Eastbourne. Staff Nurse Mihaela Tirtau will be moving to London and Staff Nurse Lorna Goldsmith will be moving to Uckfield Hospital. Health Care assistant Edelyn Roma has been offered a full time Team Leader Post in a local Care Home. We would like to wish them well in their new Jobs. Recruitment is under way to continue to expand the team and we look forward to introducing our new staff members as they join the team.

PHYSIOTHERAPY AT CROWBOROUGH HOSPITAL

You may be aware that the physiotherapy department at Crowborough Hospital is no longer open. Physiotherapy is provided locally by Sussex MSK (musculoskeletal) Partnership East which is the local NHS organisation that manages the care and treatment of patients with bone, joint and muscle conditions The service was commissioned in 2015 by the Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs) that manage health services in the majority of East Sussex (High Weald, Lewes and Havens CCG and Eastbourne, Hailsham and Seaford CCG). Their aim was to make MSK care more efficient, cost effective and more accessible for patients in this area.

Currently they only have sufficient work in Crowborough to use the physiotherapy facilities for one day a week and it is not cost effective to pay full time rental on the facility for that. Therefore a smaller space in Grove House will be used for a day a week. This has come about partly due to the increased in GP referrals to the Horder Centre for orthopaedic cases.

This Physio arrangement is in addition to that planned for the long-term pain management clinics being run by SCFT. (see below)

A certain amount of the physio equipment will be used at Grove House and there is a possibility of some more being used in the neuro rehabilitation sessions in the Day Centre.

At the moment, various groups including the Friends are looking into possible alternative uses for the old physiotherapy unit.

PAIN MANAGEMENT PROGRAMME

Recently, Angel Busuttil, Consultant Clinical Psychologist and Joanna Fry, Service Manager for Clinical Health and Psychology, of Sussex Partnership Trust, attended a Committee meeting of the Friends to introduce the pain management programme, currently run in Eastbourne, which was due to start at Grove House one day per week.

The impact of living with pain on physical and mental health, including increased risk of heart disease, depression, suicide and substance abuse and dependency has been recognised. The programme, which has been designed to bring all services dealing with spinal, rheumatologic and muscular skeletal conditions together, will provide an applied pain management scheme through e.g. gardening, exercise programmes and kitchen skills and will build skills for those who wish to return to work. There is no age restriction on attendees who may self refer via an online form on MSK's website.

The scheme, which is part of MSK will offer physiotherapy, rheumatology and occupational and orthopaedic therapy. Psychologists will be involved both individually and in groups; groups have been shown to be of particular benefit and support with those attending remaining in contact with each other afterwards.

Assessments started on 3rd April and the interview rooms, former dining room and kitchen, store rooms and courtyard garden at Grove House will be used.

"I've had a look at the most current Crowborough MIU data, and though this dropped in the last four months of 2017, it has since picked up and is currently 14% above the planned target for the 2017-18 financial year. We recently invested in further training for the nurses there to ensure they are able to treat as many different complaints as possible to avoid patient journeys to A & E."

Behind the scenes of the Committee of the Friends

As a registered charity, the Friends has to comply with various regulations made by the Charities Commission, many of these regulations have recently changed and the Committee has continued its consideration of the Charity Governance Code for Smaller Charities

The number and value of donations we receive is an indication of the trust donors have in FoCH and therefore of our integrity.

In relation to safeguarding and promoting the charity's reputation, there has been discussion about acceptance and refusal of donations according to their origin. A policy will be created covering this, having first checked what larger charities in the sector do.

Code of conduct – adherence to the Charity Governance Code satisfies this requirement.

Nolan Report - Seven Principles of Public Life – years of existence and experience without serious difficulty or challenge demonstrate we have upheld the 7 principles and served the public well.

We have policies in place to deal with all forms of **conflict of interest**. However, we do not specifically have a policy on declaring hospitality; therefore in future we will include declarations of hospitality in our declaration of interests and gifts policy.

Safeguarding - The Charity Commission has issued a reminder document about safeguarding. It contains nothing new and we are fully compliant.

Raffle tickets and General Data Protection Regulation,

A local supermarket has declined to continue to allow us to sell raffle tickets in their shop because we collect personal data when we sell the tickets (name and phone number). Revised guidance will be issued to ticket sellers to overcome concerns. Any purchaser may choose not to give personal contact data and will then have to check if they have won a prize by looking at a list of winners which will be posted in the location where they bought the tickets and on the notice board in the hospital.


